I was then cast as Danny in Night Must Fall by Emlyn Williams - at sixteen, exactly the right age for the part - and this gave me the 'acting bug'. Joining the New Era Players, I played several important, enjoyable rôles - particularly George Gibbs in Our Town by Thornton Wilder. We were invited to the Victoria Theatre, where I played Biff in Arthur Miller's Death of a Salesman - a very moving experience.



For the S-O-T Operatic Society, I took major rôles in Merry Widow. Oklahoma!. Vie Parisienne. Kiss Me Kate and, in 1974 at The Regent, The Mikado, playing Koko. In The White Horse Inn I had a wonderful comedy rôle as Grinkle Ebenezer (underwear, Oldham!) North Staffs Operatic

Society's Fiddler on the Roof, I played the Innkeeper -

I was grateful to the late Peter Legge, who cast me as the Adjutant in Conduct Unbecoming - a terrific part. I asked, "Why me?" He said, "You've played a lot of comic parts, it's time you did a serious one for once." Then there was Death Trap, in which Derek Yeomans and I tried to kill each other for most of the play! Also memorable are

Arsenic and Old Lace (with son, Howard), Climb the Greased Pole (with daughter, Cathy), The Long, the Short and the Tall (Sergeant Mitchum) and Under Milkwood. In The Happiest Days of your Life, as the Headmaster, everything that could possibly go wrong did! But again, the audience played its part extremely well. (Where would we be without you?) In Out of Order I was presumably 'dead' for the first act - thrown around and hung behind a door - with Vaseline in my nostrils to stop me from sneezing! It was great to play Dick Dead Eye in HMS Pinafore and Private Willis, 'B' Company, Grenadier Guards in Iolanthe - a nice solo song with full orchestra - what a thrill!

Lately, I have rendered some works by our Chairman, Peter Dutton, in Potteries dialect, and people still ask me to do 'voice overs' and short films. Over the years, I've made many friends and, I hope, not many enemies. The crux of the matter is teamwork with fellow members to create a rapport with the audience and, once again, we thank you.



Tom, a Rep season ticket holder, was born at Heron Cross, Fenton. He attended Heron Cross Infant and Junior School, where his talent for drawing was discovered. He won a scholarship to the junior art department, then on to Burslem College of Art, where he was a pupil of the late Paul Clarke. Sadly, his ambition to go on to the Royal College of Art was put to an end when his father was tragically killed in a mining accident.

He started to work as a junior designer at Adderley China pottery, Fenton, under the excellent tuition of the late Mrs. Alice Turner and continued his studies at night school. After National Service in 1957, at the age of 23, he went to work for Rataud's Ltd, a ceramic transfer company, manufacturers for the pottery industry. Many of his designs were accepted by the pottery industry and also many of the leading retail stores. In 1997, after 40 years with the same company, he retired and now enjoys his hobbies of travelling, watercolour painting, pastels and crown green bowling. Tom is married with two grown up sons.
