

Here is a little information about our theatre which first-time visitors may find helpful:

CAR PARKING

The Rep has parking space available in the school yard of the Cauldon Primary School, directly opposite the theatre. Patrons are encouraged to use this facility. Cars are parked at the owner's risk, no responsibility can be accepted by the Repertory Theatre.

REFRESHMENTS

Theatre Bar: This is open from half an hour before the curtain rises until the end of normal licensing hours. Interval drinks may be ordered before the performance.

We must advise patrons that our licence restricts the consumption of Bar Refreshments to that area of the theatre only. Persons under the age of 14 years are not permitted to enter the Theatre Bar.

Coffee: Coffee will be served to patrons in their seats during the interval. Coffee tickets are available in the auditorium and should be purchased before the performance.

Confectionery: A full range is available, and on sale in the auditorium before the performance. Patrons are respectfully asked not to rustle confectionery wrappings as it can mar the enjoyment of others.

SMOKING: Smoking is not permitted in the auditorium.

PHOTOGRAPHY: Photography and/or tape (including video tape) recordings in the auditorium during a public performance are prohibited.

The Rep is a member of the Little Theatre Guild of Great Britain, and is affiliated to the British Theatre Association and International Amateur Theatre Association.

THE PLAY

After being rejected by many theatre managements, 'Journey's End' was performed in December, 1928, for a single Sunday evening performance by the Incorporated Stage Society, with 21 year old Laurence Oliver playing Stanhope.

Only after strong support from George Bernard Shaw was the play eventually performed in the West End, at the Savoy Theatre, in 1929, but with Colin Clive as Stanhope. Two actors who were to become famous classical performers in the 1930's and 1940's were in the cast: Maurice Evans as Raleigh and Robert Speaight as Hibbert.

The play was an immediate success, running for two years at the Savoy, became a triumph in America and was subsequently translated and played all over the world.

It was filmed in Hollywood in 1930, with Colin Clive repeating his role as Stanhope, the cast and director all British. This was the very first Anglo-American film co-operation.

'Journey's End' was the first play about the First World War to become a popular success. Though not specifically an anti-war play, it explores in a realistic and emotionally moving way the reactions and relationships of a small group of officers in a dug-out at St. Quentin in 1918, revealing the tensions and horrors of trench warfare.

Beneath the trivial public schoolboy language and the veneer of idealism and self-confidence lie all the fears and terrors of war, experienced by what Wilfred Owen called 'the doomed youth' of his generation.



THE AUTHOR

Robert C. Sherriff, novelist and dramatist, was born in 1896 and died in 1975. Educated at Kingston Grammar School and New College, Oxford, he joined his father's insurance business until the outbreak of war in 1914, in which he served as a captain in the East Surrey regiment.

Rejoining the insurance business in 1918 he developed a great interest in amateur theatre, which led him to writing. 'Journey's End' was his first play (1928), followed by 'Badger's Green' (1930), 'St. Helena' (1935), written in collaboration with the comedienne Jeanne de Casalis, 'Home at Seven' (1950), 'The White Carnation' (1953), 'The Long Sunset' (1955) and 'A Shred of Evidence' (1960).

He wrote a considerable number of film scripts, including: 'The Invisible Man' (1933), 'Goodbye Mr. Chips' (1933), 'The Four Feathers' (1938), 'Lady Hamilton' (1941), 'Odd Man Out' (1945), 'No Highway' (1950) and 'The Dam Busters' (1955).

THIS PRODUCTION

We are extremely grateful to a number of people whose roles have changed during the rehearsal period: to John Collier, who moved from playing Raleigh to take over the part of Stanhope when local actor Tim Churchill turned professional a few weeks ago; to James Freeman, who moved from playing Hibbert to play Raleigh; to Craig Wood, who was specially invited to join the company to play Hibbert; and to Malcolm Rushton, who came in only two weeks ago when our lighting director had to go abroad for his company. We welcome Richard Morrey, a new member, in his first part at the theatre and four members of the Young Rep: Steven Meaney, Edward Stokes, Ben and Phil.

During the performance extracts from the following poems are used: 'The Soldier' by Rupert Brooke; 'Dreamers' by Siegfried Sassoon; 'The Dug-Out' by Siegfried Sassoon; 'Rendezvous' by Alan Seeger; 'Anthem for Doomed Youth' by Wilfred Owen; 'May, 1915' by Charlotte Mew; 'Aftermath' by Siegfried Sassoon - all written between 1914 and 1918.
