NOTES ON BILL NAUGHTON

Bill Naughton used to be a coal-bagger and lorry driver in Bolton. His family moved there in 1914 from Ireland, when he was four. His father was a miner, and Naughton began work at fourteen in the mill. June Evening, his best known television play is set in a Bolton Street, 1921. Most of his Lilliput stories were of the industrial North. Yet in 1945 after living five years in South-East London as a Civil Defence driver, Naughton published a long article The Spiv (Spiv: Suspected Person: Itinerant Vagabond) which brought this London slang word into popular use.

Recently Naughton has become known for a series of Third programme documentary dramas, three of which have been Italia Prize entries. The Long Carry about coal picking; Wigan to Rome, a coach journey; and Jackie Crowe, the life of a gambler; yet the most noted was again a London piece called Alfie Elkins and his Little Life. He must be one of the few writers who have had plays on the Third and Light programmes in the same evening (although he finds no need for any basic distinction here).

He has published a number of books, mostly autobiographical. Naughton enjoys a game of football — playing, not watching. He watches scarcely anything of an organised nature — and has neither television nor radio set. He thinks his job is to get some real life down on paper when he can. He is fond of talking and hard to stop once he gets going. And he finds he works best in a not too hard up obscurity.
